
We were lucky enough to see some Mountain Sheep, a herd of wild horses along with several snakes in camp or the sites with only one being a rattlesnake.

The weather was wonderful, not too hot and even though big black clouds appeared in the afternoon, there was no rain but we did have some wind.



# **Independence Day History**

We celebrate Independence Day to commemorate that auspicious July 4th in 1776 when the Continental Congress adopted the <u>Declaration of Independence</u>, formally declaring the independence of the American colonies from the United Kingdom. Thomas Jefferson is recognized as the principal writer of the Declaration of Independence, although the Jefferson version was revised a couple times before actually being adopted by the Continental Congress.

John Hancock, President of the Continental Congress, signed the Declaration of Independence first, and did so with much fanfare and in the largest handwriting of all the signers. As a result of his prominent signature, his name has come to be a colloquialism in America for anyone's signature.

John Adams, later to become President of the United States, predicted in July of 1776 in a letter to his wife, Abigail, that Independence Day festivities would be celebrated with fireworks (illuminations):

"The day (Independence Day) will be the most memorable in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival....it ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade...bonfires and illuminations (fireworks) from one end of this continent to the other, from this day forward forevermore."

Today, Independence Day has become as much a day of celebrating the American family as celebrating American independence and freedom. Families get together in backyards and parks for picnics, fellowship, games, and, of course, fireworks.

#### Geodes

These gem rocks are often called "thunder eggs" and are found as stone balls with a crystal, topaz, or amethyst center. Geodes sometimes have bands of jasper or agate surrounding their crystalline centers. Tiny or immense, they are found in all colors, as stones of great beauty. When sliced open, they reveal an unparalleled crystal universe within. The ones we prize the most are the geodes that contain amethyst.

Geodes are usually found in deposits where two massive land forms have come together. In formation, water between two rocks was unable to be released during the movement of the rocks. Eventually, a formed thunder egg was spit out and usually found rolling down the side of a mountain, like a rolling marble. These wonder stones are found abundantly in Mexico and the southwestern United States. More often found in the Western Hemisphere, they have rarely been noted in the folklore of the Eastern world.

# **California State Symbols**

The saber-toothed cat (*Smilodon californicus*) was adopted by the Legislature as the official State Fossil in 1973. Fossil evidence indicates that this member of the cat family with 8-inch upper canine teeth was somewhat shorter than a modern lion, but weighed more. This meat-eater was very common in California during the late Pleistocene epoch that ended about 11,000 to 10,000 years ago. Fossil bones of *Smilodon californicus* have been found in abundance preserved in the tar pits of Rancho La Brea in Los Angeles.



Benitoite was designated as the official State Gemstone in 1985. Sometimes called the "blue diamond", it was first discovered near the headwaters of the San Benito River from which it derived its name. The gem is extremely rare and ranges in color from a light transparent blue to dark, vivid sapphire blue, and occasionally it is found in a violet shade.



As one might expect, gold is the official state mineral and was so designated in 1965. In the four years following the discovery of gold by James Marshall in January of 1848, California's population swelled from 14,000 to 250,000 people. Miners came from all over the world and extracted 28,280,711 fine ounces of gold from 1850-1859 which would be worth approximately \$10,000,000,000 today. Although production is much lower, present day prospectors can still pan for gold in California's streams.
