Minutes of April Board Meeting: The Board Meeting minutes were approved after the correction of the Camp Paradise rate. The fee is \$300 per week, not \$900. Camp Paradise is a rockhound camp where people can learn to develop various aspects of finished rock products like cutting or jewelry making. **Treasurer's Report**: Account balances were read by Charles Lindquist who stated we were in good shape and all bills were paid to date.

Correspondence: There was a nice note from Pete Howell with a dollar for his birthday and to thank the club for the newsletter. He likes to read about the club and all the people, it brightens his day.



Remembering Bob Lawton by Charles Lindquist

I attended the Memorial Service for Bob Lawton, a nice service officiated by a deacon of the church who know Bob well but mentioned that Bob didn't exactly beat the doors down to get to church.

Friends offered remembrances. Several friends met Bob through his developing land in "You Bet". There are a "Lawton" and "Eowana" streets in that development. (I was not aware of his work as developer). All spoke well of his adherence to his strong beliefs and the listening to other's beliefs. I was usually on the other side of the aisle from him but recall giving him printed material which he was gracious enough to receive (although he may have used the paper to wrap fish).

I had decided that I would offer my bit as a tribute but after three speakers, it was decided to continue with the formal servicer. But, I would like to offer a thought here. Dore' and I knew Bob and Eowana primarily through NCGMS field trips. As young'ens with two small kids, we traveled, well, not in style. We went on trips in a 1977 Green VW Camper (bought from Hank, for those who remember). A fond remembrance of Bob and his wife, Eowana, was at camp, usually a dry camp somewhere in the desert of Utah or Nevada. They would beckon us over to their motor home and offer us a tasty, COOL drink, a Tom Collins or some such. They sure traveled well!

For 5 1/2 years, Bob took total care of Eowana after her stroke and never complained. For that and everything else he will be remembered always.

Robert "Bob" W. Lawton Jr. died May 4. 2008 in Grass Valley. He was 92 years old and had lived in Grass Valley since 1946. He enjoyed R.V. traveling, rockhounding and lapidary and was a long time member of the Nevada County Gem & Mineral Society.

A Note from Bill Budd

Hi, I'm not sure this constitutes news but last Friday (5/16), the same day I was planning to go on that field trip to NV with Terry Bartels but decided to cancel due to the heat, I spent the night in the ER at the hospital with an acute vertigo attack. It came on while I was watching the 10 PM news which, although depressing as usual, was probably not the cause of the attack. The room was spinning wildly and tended to make me sick. Laying down made it worse so I got up and walked around which lessened the severity, sort of. After over an hour of walking around the house, I decided it wasn't going away so I called 911 who guickly came with a fire truck and an ambulance and about 6 people. There's really no need for a fire truck but during past times when Lois was often transported to the hospital by ambulance the fire truck was always part of the rescue team. I think they get paid by the mile or maybe just want to be where the action is. I wouldn't let them lay me down on the gurney because that made me even more dizzy (and sick) so I just sat up on it. I thought maybe they would run the siren but they said no. Even though the ER was crowded with only one doctor for 6 or 7 people they managed to give me an IV, take 6 vials of blood and do a CT scan of my head. The digitized results of the scan were sent to Australia (it was daytime there) via satellite around 1 or 2 AM with results returned about an hour later. They found no indication of damage to my inner ear. Vertigo is caused by an inner ear problem like an infection or a virus or some trauma to the head. Actually they don't know a whole lot about vertigo even though the ER sees several cases every year. About all they can do is give you some meds that include a strong antihistamine and a valium (?). Anyway, around 3 AM, I found I could lie down without getting dizzy and finally got a little sleep, which wasn't easy with all the activity in the ER, not to mention the blazing bright lights they keep on all night. By 5:30 AM all the tests had been run without finding much of anything and the very busy doctor told me I could go home since I was no longer bothered by the vertigo and he was tired of having me ask when I could go home, not that I saw him that often. They got me a cab and I arrived home by 6:30 AM.

Another non-news item...I'm scheduled for prostate cancer surgery 6/17. I think I'm beginning to fall apart. See you soon, Bill

AMFS President's Message by Shirley Leeson

This month I'd like to mention something important. I have been receiving reports from the *Blue Ribbon Coalition* regarding openings for the BLM RESOURCE ADVISORY COUNCIL in many of the westernstates. I have forwarded them to many individuals and clubs throughout the western regions hoping someone would step up and offer to make themselves available.

What a wonderful surprise when **Glen R. Miller** of the ShastaGem & Mineral Society of Redding, CA offered to apply for the Northwest California BLM Resource Advisory Council. Letters were sent on his behalf from myself and John Wright, our AFMS Conservation and Legislation Chair. Then **Norvie Enns** of the Reno Gem & Mineral Society put in an application for the Northeast California BLM Resource Advisory Council and again John Wright and I sent letters of support for his nomination.

I contacted **Hugh Brady** of Fair Oaks CA, member Roseville Rock Rollers Gem and Mineral Society. Hugh promptly contacted the BLM in Folsom, CA and requested an application for the BLM Resource Advisory Council of Central California. Again, both John Wright our AFMS Conservation and Legislation Chair and I wrote letters of support. There were also letters of support sent by Dick Pankey, CFMS Past President and others from the CFMS in support of the nominations on the above people from California.

I e-mailed our club in Bitterroot, Montana regarding an opening on the BLM Resource Advisory Committee of Western Montana and **Wayne Farley** stepped to the plate and made himself available. Letters from John, myself and Evelyn Cataldo, 2nd VP of Northwest were sent on his behalf. Next, **Evan Day**, member of the Golden Spike Gem and Mineral Society of Ogden, Utah applied for the BLM Utah Resource Advisory Council. Letters of support were sent by John Wright, Joan Day, executive secretary of the Northwest Federation and myself.

Finally, **Michael Nelson** of the Colorado Springs Mineral Society, Colorado Springs, CO put his application in for BLM Colorado Resource Advisory Council. Unfortunately I was on the road and unable to offer a letter of support, but I did contact John Dow of the Canon City office of the BLM on my return from a three week road trip.

Perhaps this doesn't seem much to many of you, BUT until these men stepped forward, the BLM had no idea who we were. Many of us assume "everyone knows who the rockhounds are" but this just isn't true. We may or may not get these people on the various advisory boards for the BLM, but at least the BLM knows who we are now.

All of the nominations above will have to go to the U.S. Secretary of Interior for confirmation later, but at least we got our foot in the door. Please go to the <amfed.org> website, click on "Rockhound Information" then click on Bureau of Land Management, then for regional information click on the state. Current information on what the BLM is doing in your state will come up. At this time there are no applications being taken for BLM Resource Advisory Council in any of the states. That closed April 14th, 2008, but keep it in mind and check frequently.

Dee and I have just returned from our sixth year at Eastern Federation's Wildacres Workshop in North Carolina. We have taken the Judges Training class there, sponsored by the AFMS since it's inception in 2003. The purpose of the course, taught by Jay Bowman, is to have one person from each regional federation who is currently either on the rules committee or a judge or exhibitor and bring them together so that the AFMS will have everyone on the same page when judging at the AFMS level. The program has been enormously successful, BUT except in the Northwest and California Federations, we aren't getting enough people to compete. I hope this changes...

Have you sent your letter supporting "Birthstone Gemstone Stamps" to the U.S. Postal Service yet? Don't let "someone else" do it. We need all of you to support this effort.
