

Rock Samples for US Forest Service

CFMS members have an opportunity to create a unique collection of rocks and minerals from the National Forests of California. And I am sure that the rocks that we want are already collected. I am working with Mike Hunerlach, a Mining Geologist with the Washington Office of Minerals and Geology, and Regional Liaison for the Pacific Southwest Region of the National Forest Service. In previous issues of the CFMS Newsletter I had articles with the details about what rocks we are looking for. I have heard from several collectors from around California who have told me that they have specimens to donate for this project. So far I have been promised specimens from the Angeles, Los Padres, Mendocino, Modoc, Sequoia, National Forests. And we still need rocks from the Cleveland, Eldorado, Inyo, Klamath, Lassen, Plumas, San Bernardino, Shasta-Trinity, Six Rivers, and Stanislaus National Forests and the Lake Tahoe Basin Management Unit.

Do you live near any of these Forests? Have recently or in the past collected in any of these Forests? If so you probably already have what we need in your rock pile. We want to get specimens that are "typical" and representative of each National Forest. We are not trying to get samples of "every rock" in every Forest. Size should be in the range of miniature to small cabinet specimen (2-4 inches in diameter). And each sample needs to be identified with: name of rock or mineral; location collected including which National Forest; GPS position (very desirable); when collected; name of person and society; and any other specific information you wish to provide.

The purpose of this project is two fold: one is to make a collection for use by the Forest Service and secondly to make a collection for the CFMS. If you would like to help with this project and donate rocks, please send me an e-mail with the name of the rock and the name of the National Forest where it was collected. Please email (dickpankey@juno.com) or contact me before bringing or sending me specimens to avoid duplication. The rest of the information can be supplied when you give me your donation. Go through your rock pile and collecting records to see what you have to donate to this project. I will accept your donation anytime but need to have all the rocks by early November. Delivering your donations to me at the November Directors' meeting in Visalia should be convenient for all.

This project has many benefits to rockhounds and the CFMS. Working with the managers of our public lands is one way to develop a personal relationship enabling us to get to know one another; it will show what and where we collect so that these areas can be preserved for future collecting; it enhances our position and credibility as a responsible user of public lands; and other benefits. Over the years CCM&GS members have taken field trips and collected rocks and minerals in many of California's National Forests.

A challenge with a request of this nature is to get this information to the collectors who have the rocks and would like to participate. I am asking for help from the people in each society that gets the CFMS Newsletter: "Please pass this request on to your field trip chairman and members." Details were in the May CFMS Newsletter or e-mail me for more information. Thank you all for your help and participation.

Bench Tips

REMOVING A STONE FROM BEZEL SETTING

If you've forgotten to use dental floss and got your stone caught in a bezel, there's one thing you can try before starting to pry. Find some sticky wax or beeswax. Roll it into a pencil-sized cylinder and stick the end onto the top of the stone. Mold it on well and yank.

If all else fails, you either have to very carefully pry open the bezel with a sharp knife blade or drill a small hole in back of the stone and push it out with the point of a scribe.

MAKING YOUR OWN MOKUME

FOREDOM STAND

A quick and easy way to suspend a Foredom over your jewelry bench is to use some steel pipe components from your local hardware store. It attaches with a couple screws and costs a little over \$10

I use 1/2 inch galvanized pipe and fittings. To build a stand that attaches to the top of your bench, all you'll need is a flange and a thirty inch length of the pipe. If you prefer a stand that attaches to the side of your bench, you'll need a little longer pipe, three foot, a flange, and a 90 degree "street elle".

Finally, make a hook that goes into the top of the pipe to hang the motor from. You can use heavy coat hanger wire or better yet, a 1/8 steel rod from the hardware store.

I love rocks and minerals because they are what interest me. I love looking at all the different types, colors, and shapes of rocks and minerals. I enjoy seeing the many different rock formations, mountains, and caves that God created for us to enjoy. I have been collecting rocks since I was about 2 years old. My favorite is collecting quartz, because it is sparkly. My favorite place to hunt for rocks and minerals is at any park or lake. I like to play and hunt for rocks. I really just love looking for rocks anywhere I go.

I have many rocks and minerals in my rock collection. There are many sizes, shapes, and colors. Many of the rocks I found, some I purchased, and also some very special ones were given to me.

Last year in first grade I did a project on what I want to be when I grow up. I want to be a geologist. I made a display with my favorite rocks and minerals. I also did some very interesting experiments.

In one experiment I placed a raw egg in a glass bottle filled with vinegar. In this experiment I learned about oxidation.

I have also learned about erosion in an experiment I did with water, sand, and rocks. I also learned to make crystals using salt; that was very interesting.

My all time favorite thing to collect is crystal quartz because I think it is beautiful.

In first grade while working on my project about geology I learned so much. I also earned many badges for all my work. I will receive most of those badges during a special meeting in December 2011.

MEMBER'S GUESTS - Allowed

COLLECTION MATERIAL – agate, jasp-agate, Lahontanite, opalite, rhyolite, local calcite is also reported to fluoresce blue. Some of the other material may fluoresce green. There are fossils nearby and time permitting, we will explore a few of these locales. If you are interested, there are a few gold (dry panning) locations nearby. Virginia City, NV is a remarkable historic silver mining town and a must see on the way home if you have never been there.

PROPOSED SCHEDULE - Arrive Friday night. Begin collecting Saturday 10 a.m. Resume collecting Sunday 11 a.m. *Saturday night, possible "foraging" excursion to a buffet in Fernley or in Fallon. We are willing to stay over on Monday if there is interest although we might move to a "dry camp".

MEET - Dayton State Park & Campground in Dayton, NV

DIRECTIONS TO SITE/CAMP – From Interstate 80, travel East through Reno, NV. Go 31 miles to the town of Fernley, NV, then South on Alternate 95 to Highway 50. Travel West on Highway 50 to Dayton State Park.

From Highway 50, continue through South Lake Tahoe to Carson City, NV. In central Carson City, turn Right off of 395/50 and continue East on Highway 50 to the town of Dayton and the State Park & Campground. We will assemble there.

VEHICLE REQ'S – Providing the weather remains dry, most vehicles should be able to manage dirt roads, however, high clearance and 4WD is preferred. We encourage carpooling.

CAMP/FACILITIES – Dayton State Park & Campground, motels/hotels in the region.

TOOLS – rock hammer, sturdy rucksack, decent boots, sledge. A pry bar is real handy, as is a walking stick. Remember to bring milk crates or plastic buckets to haul your material home.

SAFETY CONCERNS – use goggles and gloves. Watch for snakes, etc. Use protection from the sun. If camping, be prepared with an adequate 15 degree or less sleeping bag. Bring appropriate knit cap, gloves, parka, winter weight wool socks, thermals, etc.

CLIMATE/WEATHER – sunny, rain, windy, mild, cold, we've had it all, come prepared!

CLOTHING – be prepared for any type of weather, it could be quite warm or chilly & wet. Two years ago and a week earlier, it was in the mid-seventies. This year, it is anyone's guess.

OTHER REMARKS – This is hilly terrain, although one location is relatively flat. Walking and climbing moderately steep inclines is necessary to obtain the best material. Additionally, you ARE at altitude! At the collecting sites, **there is NO WATER** and you want to bring a least a gallon with you (per person) when hiking and have several extra in your vehicle.


