After the presentation, there will be time for members to show and describe enhanced or fake items they brought. Many have been deceived by these items, or maybe knew it was enhanced, and just liked it anyway. This is a way for all of us to learn from each other and be more educated buyers!

Show Security

TUCSON, Ariz. (KGUN) — Gem show security is becoming a concern for vendors. A high-priced knife was stolen at this year's show from a booth at the 22nd Street Tucson Gem and Mineral Show, and gem shows in Tucson have had items stolen in years past.

Some vendors are concerned after seeing thefts year after year. Depending on which show in Tucson, a permit might be required to enter. The Gem and Mineral Show on 22nd Street is open to the public.



"This one you can find fine jewelry, good stones, valuable things. We really believe this show should not be open to the public," said one vendor, Gabriela de la Torre.

Gabriela de la Torre is a Brazilian gem vendor that relies on the income the gem show brings in. She said worrying about thefts distracts from sales. "Instead of working, we are just trying to take care to make sure people aren't stealing," she said. De la Torre also wants more security for smaller booths like hers near the entrance.

Oke Millett with Discovery Gems and Jewellery has been working on this gem show for eight years. He understands why others would want more security. "I would say every year there's at least one horrible story of something pretty bad happening and something getting taken for a lot of money," he said.



Still, he would prefer not to go in that direction. "It's difficult. It has to be a welcoming environment for everybody. I don't know how many people come to a show, 50,000 or more, so we don't want it to look like they're coming into an armed situation," said Millett.

As someone that comes year after year, Millett said awareness of what's going on in your booth is something that comes with the gem show. He also recommended glass casing for high-priced items, but he knows that's not the case for everyone.

Millett said just making relationships with neighboring booths could help keep an extra eye out.

Take Care with Crystals


Cinnabar Quartz:






In conclusion, while crystals can be beautiful and have alleged healing properties, it is important to be aware of potential risks associated with certain types of crystals. It is always important to handle them with caution and to be mindful of the potential hazards they may pose to our health.

Working with Abalone Shell

Starting with the raw shell, it must first be soaked in a chemical to rid it of algae and parasitic crustations. It is scrubbed, dried, sandblasted, before it is ready for cutting. Rough shapes are formed by saw, drill, and dremel tools using diamond edged tools. This work should be done under water, with a worker wearing a respirators, plus fans blowing for ventilation to protect the workers from Silicosis, due to dust of Calcium Carbonate from shells.



After the cutting operations are completed, shell parts can be placed in a tumbler for 24 to 72 hours with three changes of grit. The shell is then washed, and buffed to a high gloss finish. This last operation can be done either mechanically or by hand. The shell should now be a beautiful creation of vivid color worthy of any jewelry setting.

All that is left now is the imagination of the craftsman. The shell can be drilled for jump rings, epoxied for any glued style, or prong set for special effects. Completion of any of these operations assures the individual of the finest in Abalone jewelry.
