May Board Meeting Minutes (5/6/2025)

Call to Order at 1814 by President Jan Longacre.

Guests present: Frank VanHecke, Federation Rep and Gwen Fissel, Junior Division Leader.

Quorum was determined by Jan Longacre.

Minutes of the April Board Meeting were reviewed and a correction was noted by Jan. The April minutes do not state that Jan Longacre gave the Show Report in Joyce Emerson's absence. Motion to accept the minutes with the above correction was made by Christie Harris, and seconded by Edwina Swenson. Motion carried seven ayes, 0 nays.

Treasurer's Report: Mike reported one check written for \$173.72 for newsletter expenses and member badges, and one deposit of \$35.00. Motion to accept the Treasurer's report was made by Debe Taylor and seconded by Edwina Swenson. Motion carried with seven ayes and 0 nays.

Show Chair: Jan Longacre signed the corrected Fairgrounds contract on 05 April, as Joyce Emerson was incapacitated at the time it was received.

Junior Division: Gwen Fissel, as Junior Division (J.D) Leader, reported that the American Federation of Minerals Society is in oversite of all club junior divisions. There is no stipulation in regard to livescans or additional insurance to cover the J.D. leader or division. It is covered by the paid membership of the parents.

She has two junior members registered, with the possibility of some older members if suitable instruction can be found, i.e., gold panning and other older kid (think teens) activities. Gwen also gave a brief overview of the history of the Junior Division and passed around a copy of *The Mini Miner*, the monthly newletter for the J.D.

Tar Seeps in California

Not Just Slow Death, But Also Rockhounding!

Many Californians have heard of, or even visited, La Brea Tar Pits, without realizing there are other tar seeps in the state. Thousands of seeps of varying size may be found here, located in 28 counties, so there's probably one near you.

McKittrick, off of Interstate 5, has a large area of tar, with several tar creeks that actually flow (ooze?). It was the site of tar mines back in the day, and is now dominated by the petroleum extraction industy. The area looks like something out of Mad Max, industrial and polluted, with epic views and swirling dust devils dancing among the pipes. And as in most areas with tar, one can find fossils and other interesting rocks and minerals.

The town of Petrolia is (obviously) named for its seeps. One of the town's parks has a seep which locals will light on fire and then use to roast hot dogs. Good times!

Red Bluff also has a large area of seeps, with hot springs, the site of a historic health spa. The area is now closed to the public, but if you find your way into it, bring a long lighter so you can light the hot springs on fire. Seriously, burning water. Just don't be IN the tub when you do this.

Our coastline seems to hold a large number of tar seeps, with Carpinteria (near Santa Barbara) being the largest, bigger even, than La Brea. Large numbers of fossils have been found here as well.

And there are hundreds, if not thousands of tiny seeps scattered throughout the state, often only recognized as an oily sheen on a local creek.
